UPDATED Drone Legal Update Training

The Illinois Legislature passed, and the Governor has signed the "Drones as First Responders" Act. This new legislation went into effect immediately, and now allows law enforcement to use drones as a tool to help protect crowds attending parades and other events. There are certain restrictions and policy requirements with the new law, and law enforcement personnel should familiarize themselves with the rules prior to deployment.
